A Comparative Analysis: The Women of The House on Mango Street and Esperanza

The House on Mango Street by Sandra Cisneros and the character of Esperanza have become iconic in the world of literature. The novel explores the experiences of women living in a predominantly Latino neighborhood in Chicago. Her process of self-identification entails realizing that she is growing more mature, figuring out her sexuality, and understanding her culture as a Latina woman [3]. The House on Mango Street describes how Latina women face problems in their society, not allowing them to fit in and treating them as second-class citizens [4]. Esperanza's desire for independence and agency is evident in her fascination with high-heeled shoes. She relishes the power the shoes seem to give her and plays with the idea that physical beauty could help her escape the squalor of her surroundings [5]. Through Esperanza's experiences, we gain insight into the complexities of being a woman in her community and the ways in which she navigates her own path to find her voice and place in the world.

When comparing and contrasting the women in The House on Mango Street with Esperanza, we find both similarities and differences. Esperanza, as a fictional character created by Cisneros, serves as a vessel to bring about sensitive, alert, and rich literature. She is the protagonist in the novel and is used to convey the experiences and perspectives of the women in her community [6]. The novel itself serves as a coming-of-age story, illustrating how Esperanza's experiences on Mango Street play a significant role during her period of growth [7].
